Heavenly Delight—full of Easter Promise

Do you remember the adverts for Turkish Delight chocolate when you were a child?

Turkish Delight Full of Eastern Promise

Those chocolate bars were a source of fascination to me. Unlike the others of that era, (do you remember Fry's Chocolate Cream—plain or 5 flavours, or Munchies, or 2d bars of Dairy Milk?) they had a jelly-like centre with a slightly different taste. As a child, I was never sure if I liked it or not! The advertisements seemed more alluring than the sweet itself!

Advertisements can sometimes be like that. They can promise the world and not quite deliver when we buy the product. Today, many years down the line, we mutter things like: 'It doesn't taste like it used to.' 'It's got smaller!' 'I don't think I like it anymore.'

There are all sorts of reasons for that. Times change. We hold the memory of events in our minds, forgetting that the way we saw and experienced them as a child can be different to when we are adults. Sometimes this can bring with it disappointment or disillusionment.

My minddrifted into thinking about how we view holidays such as Christmas and Easter, Ascension, Whitsun (Pentecost Sunday) and Harvest. Once focal events for the nation and community, when everyone turned up at Church for the Festival Service, they seem to have lost their importance these days for the wider community. Yes, the world celebrates, but mostly without considering the origins of the event. Somewhere along the line over the past century, thanksgiving and prayer, praise and worship have become lost in the crowds of commercialism and self-interest.

Harsh words? Unashamedly yes; especially when we think about what Easter (our current celebration) is about. Now don't get me wrong, I'm as happy as anyone to devour a bit of chocolate. I love to see the lambs in the fields and cuddly toy bunny rabbits. Easter comes at a point in the year when we are emerging from winter and relishing the signs around us of new birth and the land 'waking up' as it were from its winter slumber.

But let's make no mistake. The celebration of Easter is about more than chocolate and rabbits or Eastern Promise! It's a celebration that over 2000 years ago God came into the world he had created, in order to make it possible for his wayward creation to come back into relationship with him; to come back into the fold, as it were.

When Jesus grew into a man, he moved around the country now known as Israel and taught people what it meant to live as God originally intended. His teaching was radical—it challenged the religious authorities of the time and because of that, concerned the Romans, who were occupying the land. They didn't want local unrest. Between them, the two authorities agreed, for different reasons, that Jesus was a threat and so he was put to death. What they didn't realise was that they were dealing with the very One who had created them. On the cross, Jesus made it possible for us to come back into a relationship with God. He 'paid the price' in human terms. But human death couldn't hold him and on Easter morning he was alive again—the same and yet different.

'How can that be?', people asked at the time, and still do. 'It's not possible'. Jesus had already told them, but they didn't understand.

He said, 'Whoever believes in me will not die, but have everlasting life.'

In other words, when our bodies here on earth are worn out, if we love God and are in relationship with him, he will give us a new (heavenly) body and we will live with him for eternity.

That is what we celebrate at Easter. Jesus is making it possible for us to live together with God for ever—beyond this world - if only we recognise that we got it wrong in the first place.

That's a heavenly promise—so much more than a chocolate bar!

Enjoy your celebrations this Easter. Just don't forget what and why you are celebrating.

April is looking to be a busy month.

We start with Palm Sunday on 2nd April. Canon Rose Lawley will be leading our service at 10am, when Palm Crosses will be given out, recognising Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, when the crowds were so excited to see him. On Maundy Thursday there will be a service of Holy Communion at 7pm, as we prepare for the sombre events of Good Friday. As always, our gazebo will be in the centre of the village, giving away free Hot Cross Buns to passers by, from 10am—12 noon. There are no strings attached to this. Do come and have a quick nibble as you pass by!

Mel Evans will lead a service of Meditation, beginning at 2pm in St Mary's Church, where we will think about the last few hours before the Crucifixion.

Easter Day there will sadly be NO Son-Rise service at 6.30am. There will be a service of Holy Communion at 11am at St Mary's Church, alongside other services in the Benefice. Times can be found on page 36.

The Big Event of April is the licensing and Induction of the Reverend Kina Robertshaw as Rector of the Benefice on **Tuesday 18th April 2023 at 7pm in St Mary's Church**, followed by refreshments in the Parish Hall. Everyone is welcome to join us in welcoming Kina to our Benefice. Her first service will be on **Sunday 23rd April at St Mary's at 10am**. This will be a Group Service for the whole Benefice. 

A Gentle Stroll...

We had a good turn out for our Sunday afternoon walk from Glazeley Church at the start of March, with nine humans, two dogs and one vicar, drawn from Glazeley, Billingsley and Highley. I am not sure what to call these walks; I advertised this in some quarters as "Forest Church" but the church was just the very lightest of touches, with simply an opening thought ("all landscape is sacred; some is consecrated, some is desecrated"). Perhaps the best I can do is to borrow a title from the writer and "Thought for the Day" presenter Brian Draper who has published a book called "Soulful Nature"; the spiritual nourishment comes simply from being in the open with like-minded people where you can talk or contemplate as you wish. I hope to be running monthly Sunday afternoon soulful strolls over the next few months; on Sunday 16th April we will meet outside Chelmarsh church at 2pm, perhaps for a gentle walk around the reservoir. All are welcome.

The Annual Parish Meeting

The meeting will be held in Glazeley Church on Thursday 13th April at 7pm; everyone interested in the church is welcome. This is where we "elect" the parochial church council; effectively the group of people who help run the church. We would especially welcome anyone who wants to join. The work is not particularly hard, we mostly deal with matters by email and telephone. The most important quality is the ability to say "Good idea vicar, but have you thought about....".

I hope by the time this article appears we will have restored the water supply to the church and the toilet will again be functional. The pump is being replaced; many thanks to Phil Bates for tracing the problem and fixing it. This incidentally is a good example of why we are so keen to continue with the 100 Club; the funds from this have paid for the replacement. Just a few years ago, we simply could not have afforded this.

Our Sunday evening services start again in April. These are normally at 6pm on the 2nd Sunday of the month but because that is Easter Day, just for April it will be on Palm Sunday, 2nd. The theme is "The very stones will cry out"; some words of Jesus to the Pharisees on Palm Sunday who wanted him to quieten the crowd who were celebrating his arrival into Jerusalem. In this case, we will look at the how the stones in Billingsley church and churchyard tell their own story of the faith of our community, going back to around 3000BC. On Easter Sunday itself, we celebrate the first communion in the benefice at 8am, where we will use the Easter Sepulchre in the wall of the church as focus for our celebrations of the Resurrection. If you do not know what an Easter Sepulchre is, come to the church the week before...

James the Least of All Beware when the choirs meet

My dear Nephew Darren,



You agonised recently over your ecumenical service: Who should be invited? Who should preach? What about the order of service? If you had attended our recent combined churches' choir festival, your own dilemmas would have seemed a little less acute.

At the pre-meeting, there was heated discussion about whether those choirs who normally wore robes would be comfortable standing among those who didn't. The more aesthetically sensitive worried whether St Agatha's pea green cassocks may clash with our red ones. Intending to be helpful, but phrasing it rather badly, someone suggested that the normally robed choirs should wear nothing. Colonel Wainwright was a little too quick to chuckle.

I began to wonder if a prize was to be awarded to the person who raised the greatest number of concerns: Should the choirs stay separate? Would the tenors be next to the altos or the basses? Where would extra seating be placed? Would the heating be on for the rehearsal? Then came what you would call the 'elephant in the room': of all the choirmasters, who would conduct and who play the organ? Tension mounted, and expressions grew grim. But before the committee started to dig trenches in my carpet and position howitzers under the desk, I briefly left the room, turned off all the electricity and claimed we'd had a power cut. This is a useful device for truculent committees; sadly, it can be used only rarely.

Come the day, an uneasy truce lasted while everyone adopted the traditional solution to disagreement within congregations, and simply did exactly what they wanted. Some were robed, some were not, some choirs congealed in their own huddles, while others joyfully sat next to people from other churches — mainly so they could point out their neighbour's wrong notes. Some sang in the right key, some sang in the wrong key, some sang what sounded like quite different songs altogether.

The service ended with one choir thinking that the organist had played too loudly, while another choir thought that the conductor wasn't up to much. Everyone agreed afterwards that we must do it again, while firmly stating that if their own choirmaster didn't conduct next year, they wouldn't be there.

Thankfully, one fundamental thing on the day united them: they all said that our church was too cold, and they all went down to the pub afterwards to warm up.

Letter from Westminster <u>Water Quality Campaign</u>

People go into politics because they want to make their communities better. I believe this is true of virtually everyone I have encountered while representing people in Shropshire in one form or another

MPs have more in common, in terms of their values and seeking to improve the lives of those they represent, than divides them.

There is widespread consensus that we all want to see our rivers and waterways in a healthy state, with clear water providing a healthy habitat and a safe environment for recreation.

This was especially so when I launched a Private Members Bill three years ago to highlight the parlous state of our rivers and the need to clean them up by cutting sewage and other pollutants. I was supported by politicians on all sides.

I have been campaigning on the issue of sewage discharges ever since. I have made it my mission to continue to do so.

There has been an attempt by some political parties to weaponise this issue. Unbelievably in our social media age this has led to death threats to MPs! Politicians need to work together rather than making reckless claims.

I have consistently acted, and voted in Parliament, including against my party whip, on measures to improve our rivers. Earlier this year I voted for new and tougher interim targets for water quality to reduce phosphates and nitrates in waterways, which the Opposition voted against.

I led the Environmental Audit Committee inquiry into water quality in our rivers which reported a year ago. It recommended a host of measures, several of which were included in the Environment Act going through Parliament at the same time, including the requirement to increase monitoring.

Last month Shrewsbury Town Council discussed what could be done to improve the condition of the River Severn. A start is being made in the catchment by Severn Trent Water's Get River Positive project. This aims to secure bathing water quality status for the River Teme upstream and downstream from South Shropshire, where £4.5m is being spent over the next two years to improve treatment and cut discharges. The first step has been to establish a baseline monitor at 19 points along the Teme to establish the condition of the river.

The BBC' last month also highlighted the horrors of sewage discharges to a wider audience. Most of those Paul Whitehouse interviewed had given evidence to our Committee. The greater awareness of the problem has been enabled by the introduction of Event Duration Monitors, which this Government required water companies to install in recent years. These monitors have brought this previously hidden practice into the open since the first data on discharges was published three years ago.

Water companies have now been required to invest £56b in improving treatment over the next 25 years. I am delighted that one of the first places to benefit will be the River Teme here in South Shropshire.



With low rain fall in February and not much rain fall this March at the time of writing. I remain concerned at the low water level of rivers and reservoirs this summer if we experience high temperatures. While drier conditions may mean less sewage discharges due to less run off, I remain concerned if we have flash floods as heavy downpours in hot weather with lower water levels, we may have worse impact from discharges.

Thank you to all who attended the recent "drop in sessions" at the Severn Centre regarding the Highley Medical Practice. All surveys completed both on the day and during the following week are being evaluated by the NHS. We are aware that not all could hear clearly, so the next information night will be in the main hall at the Severn Centre; the exact date is still to be agreed as there are several areas that need updating. Please keep a listen out for more information.

By now most may have seen that our current doctors have agreed to extend their stay until the end of June 2023 so it will remain as it is now.

The recent closure of New Road was a challenge, especially as some irresponsible people chose to totally ignore the one way systems that were there to try and ensure journeys were safer. This was a major disappointment and created a number of near misses where people could have been hurt.

We are also having issues at night with a group or groups going around the village causing damage to people's property or vehicles and our bus shelters. Most people take pride in our village, but some don't seem to care and need to be stopped. If anyone has any information, please report this to the police.

We don't praise individual Councillors enough at times, but Eileen Moore deserves our praise for the time and effort she has put in to go through our village asset register and logging the number, condition and whereabouts of all our hanging baskets, troughs and planters so that we can put in place a 3 year maintenance plan. She, along with other Councillors, have walked every public right of way and are working with Shropshire Councils Footpath Officer to see what can be done to improve these.



Highley First Responders was established about 22 years ago by a number of local volunteers, including Dave Fulton and Nigel Preece. Dave estimates that they have attended around 14 000 call outs over the years and were virtually available 24 hours a day. Due to poor health and personal reasons they have handed over the car keys to us newcomers, but Nigel and Dave still remain involved in the background today. I am pleased to say that, after a small gap in service, Highley First Response is now up and running again! Currently the responding team only consists of my husband Christo and I so we desperately need your help! Especially if we have any hope of providing the amazing service of the past, we need to grow the team. If you are interested in becoming a First Responder, please contact us on 07718644128.

Over the years the CFR role has had to evolve to fit the current environment in which we are working. The NHS is in a crisis! Ambulance response times are worse than they have ever been, and it doesn't seem like it is going to improve any time soon.

Community First Responders are 'saved' for the most critical calls—jobs where time is of the essence; for instance CPR, major trauma, heart attacks etc. This is different to the past, where they were sent out to most categories of ambulance calls. This is just no longer feasible with the ambulance response times being what they are. Once we have been sent to a call-out, we cannot leave until the ambulance arrives. This might prevent us from being available for a cardiac arrest should one occur. Also the decision as to which calls to send us to, lies with the ambulance control centre since they have oversight of ambulance availability and whatever else is going on in the area at the time.

Without the help of the community, we would not be able to provide this vital service. The role is voluntary and all costs of running the scheme come from fundraising and donations that people generously give. We have an ongoing 'Go-fund-me' account where people can donate at any time. This can be accessed by going onto the Go-fund-me website and searching for 'Highley First Responders'. It is also available on our Facebook page. Today, give your problem to God

'Cast your cares onto God and He will sustain you' Psalm 55:22

If you grow up in hard times, you will automatically do one of these two things: 1) Trust God more because you have experienced His faithfulness. 2) Worry, think, and incessantly talk about the 'what ifs' in life.
