Come to meand I will give you rest

The solution to an over busy life is not more time. It's to slow down and simplify our lives around what really matters.' (The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry: John Mark Comer)

Are you the sort of person who approaches each day with interest or even excitement to see where it takes you, or do you have a list longer than your arm of things to do? Is life about 'doing' or 'being'?

There's no doubt that there are a certain amount of things which probably need doing each day, but even then, it probably won't be the end of the world if some of them aren't done. But do we sometimes fill our lives with the *shoulds* and *oughts* and miss out on the simple joy of living in the moment?

Having been a (sometimes reluctant, but nevertheless almost compulsive) *doer*, I have recently taken myself in hand! I made the decision to retire last May and have firmly resisted continuing with all the things I used to do and be part of. I am taking time out of the busy-ness of church and village life, to allow some space in my life and to enjoy some of the pursuits there was no time for, when I was so busy. When the hours in the day are no longer enough to cover all the demands on one's time and there is no time or space to rest, it is a sure sign that something needs to change.

Several times over the last week the story of Mary and Martha has cropped up (see page 21) and as a Christian, I see these co-incidences or repetitions as God-incidences. Is He trying to get my attention?

Mary and Martha were friends of Jesus. Martha was a do-er and Mary just loved to listen to Jesus. So did Martha, but she felt the cultural norm of offering guests refreshments was important—and so it is! So there she was, slaving away in the kitchen while Mary sat listening to Jesus. Needless to say, Martha felt a bit peeved as she was doing all the work, while Mary had no intention of moving. Jesus pointed out that maybe Martha should take a break too and join in their conversation.

Over the years I've heard many sermons on this story, including one from the Bishop a few days ago. What I glean from this is that it's not an either/or judgement of who is right. It's more about motivation and good choices in each situation that arises. Hospitality is an important part of building good relationships. I'm a firm believer in that. But if we are so stressed about it all that

we are rushing around and have no time for our guests, what have we achieved? On the other hand, sometimes we choose to devote ourselves to the 'behind the scenes' stuff, in order to enable others to enjoy themselves. That's an entirely different choice and motivation. It's what Jesus called *serving others*.

The story of Mary and Martha reminds us that there are times to set aside the demands of the occasion for an even better thing—to be still and to nourished by something more than food; for our souls to be fed and watered.

That's why Sunday was always a day of rest. A day when no-one worked except the emergency services, no shops were open, there was no public entertainment, just a day to *be*, either by ourselves or with our families. A day of restoration. A day for us to have the time and space to be closer to our Creator, which the busy-ness of the week didn't allow. I mourn the loss of that.

Below, Norma Murrain describes the joy of stillness. Maybe this summer is the time for us to stop for a while and just enjoy being a Mary. Martha's jobs will still be there when the visitors have left.

The Joy of Stillness

"Be still and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10

Have you ever thought of taking some time out of daily life, to simply 'be still' with God? To hear His voice, enjoy His presence, and perhaps receive His direction for your future? When one lady was told that her friend was "taking some time out to 'be still' and listen to God", she responded with curiosity: "What does His voice sound like?"

For many Christians, the response would be this: "His voice for me is always calming, always reassuring; it always makes me feel overwhelmingly loved. It always gives me a sense of peace, which is deeper than any pain and stronger than any fear. No wonder the Scriptures talk of a 'peace that passes all understanding!'"

God speaks to us individually, through His Word, the Bible. And sometimes, when we are outside, He can also speak to us through His beautiful world.

The blue sky says; "Always Look Up", the Sun says; "Shine," the birds say; "Sing", the trees say; "be fruitful", the flowers say; "consider the Lilies", The open road ahead says; "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel". The gentle rustle of the wind in the trees says; "Though you can't see My face, you can hear Me, see reflections of Me, feel Me, touch Me and know me through all I create, if you just take the time to be still!"

Clerical studies may be lined with books, but they are largely for effect — and to hide damp patches on the wallpaper. Anything with hard covers will have been bought with the best of intentions - but somehow the vicarage lawn or the church hall drains will have taken precedence. And from what I know of your colleague over at St Crispin's, the only books he will buy will be to colour in.

I do try to keep up with my reading, but sleep mercifully intervenes after the first 10 minutes. On those days when I sit by my study window, so passers-by can see me deeply occupied in intellectual activity, it is most useful that my large tome on the letters of Eusebius can easily conceal an Agatha Christie inside it.

I confess that I was once gloriously put down when I tried to impress one of our blue stockings by mentioning a new edition of a Dostoevsky novel. She replied: "I have never read Dostoevsky in translation." It only confirmed my suspicions that she had worked as a Russian spy in earlier years.

I was hugely impressed when, during the bitter cold of last winter, the Earl of Stowe, whose library would comfortably contain one of our cathedrals, told me he was slowly getting through its contents of tens of thousands of volumes. It was only some time later that I discovered he meant he threw the occasional one on the fire, when he was running low on wood.

No, my dear Darren, the only literary activities that will spark interest will be crosswords for the majority, or diocesan reports for the truly dedicated – with weighty tomes being used as door stops.

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Letter from Westminster

Summer Recess

August is a month to which many of us look forward, especially MPs. While Westminster has its own charm amidst the cut and thrust of politics, the summer parliamentary recess provides a great opportunity to spend more time in South Shropshire helping people around the constituency, which given the beauty of our area, is always a welcome task.

As readers will know by now, I have decided not to seek re-election as Member of Parliament for Ludlow - or rather South Shropshire, as the constituency will soon be renamed. As I write, my successor as Conservative candidate has not yet been chosen by local party members, though will be in place by the time this is published. Whoever it is, I look forward to engaging with them as much as possible, and offering as much clarity as I can on local issues I have experienced over the past 18+ years as your MP.

Needless to say, I will continue to represent South Shropshire to the best of my ability until the next General Election. In previous summer recesses, that has always meant travelling to all corners of the constituency to meet constituents, organisations and other groups in South Shropshire – taking up local issues and offering to help wherever I can. As well as visiting the larger towns, as I do year-round, I can spend more time in the remote areas of South Shropshire, tackling the issues affecting smaller villages or hamlets.

This summer I also have the new opportunity to get to know those communities within the additional 100 square miles of the Severn Valley and Burnell wards, which are joining our parliamentary constituency.

Like many others, I also intend to take some time this August on holiday, travelling to Scotland with my family. I have been a fan of staycationing long before covid enforced it upon many of us, getting to know some wonderful remote parts of the UK. So I would commend it to those readers planning some time away this summer.

When Parliament returns in September, I shall be pressing forward the Environmental Audit Committee in our efforts to scrutinise environmental policies across government. I am determined to use the remaining year or so I have at the heart of our political life to do as much as I can to leave the environment in a better state for future generations. Our Committee will be pursuing our existing inquiries into air quality targets, electrification of the UK economy, and our latest inquiry into the role of natural capital - as well as looking for new lines of inquiry for the final session of this Parliament.

Depending on the date of the next General Election, this may be my last summer recess as your MP, so I look forward to making the most of it. If you see me out and about in your area and you would like to raise an issue, please do come over and say hello. Alternatively, please do get in


Dealing with Ioneliness

'Everyone abandoned me' 2 Timothy 4:16

What's the proper way to deal with loneliness? Firstly, we must *learn to be alone without feeling lonely.* Jesus often left the crowd to be alone with His Father in prayer. Why? Because He knew that solitude is essential to spiritual growth. And He came back from those times personally enriched and better equipped to deal with the challenges of life. The Bible says, 'Then Jacob was left alone; and a Man wrestled with him until the breaking of day' (Genesis 32:24 NKJV). Out of that time alone with God came a man with a new name, a new nature, a new walk, and a new future. Plus, when people realise that you can enjoy your favourite dish or movie or other activity alone, they are attracted by your strength, independence, and confidence.

Secondly, reject the idea that you cannot live without a certain person in your life. God is the only person you must have, and He has promised to always stay with you (see Hebrews 13:5). We might fall into deep loneliness after the death of a loved one because we haven't cultivated many interests outside the relationship. But it's never too late to get started. And God will help you. Paul wrote: 'The first time I was brought before the judge, no one came with me. Everyone abandonned me. May it not be counted against them. But the Lord stood with me and gave me strength so that I might preach the Good News in its entirety for all the Gentiles to hear' (2 Timothy 4:16-17 NLT). God will help you to grieve your loss, leave your loss, and go on to what

He has for you next.










MARY WAS VERY EXCITED


TOO AND WANTED TO











In the Month of August it was

⇒ 400 years ago, on 6th August 1623 that Anne Hathaway died. She was William Shakespeare's wife.

- ⇒ 125 years ago, on 23rd August 1898 that the British Antarctic Expedition set off from London and became the first to spend winter on the Antarctic mainland and cross the Ross Ice Shelf. It was the first British expedition of the Heroic Age of Antarctic Exploration. The expedition returned to London in June 1900.
- ⇒ 100 years ago, on 29th August 1923 that Richard Attenborough, British film actor and director was born. Best known for his roles in *The Great Escape*, and *Jurassic Park*. He also directed films including *A Bridge Too Far, Cry Freedom* and *Gandhi*. Died 2014.
- ⇒ 80 years ago, on 25th August 1943 that British Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten became Supreme Allied Commander South East Asia.
- ⇒ 70 years ago, on 21st August 1953 that the UK premiere of the romantic comedy film *Roman Holiday* took place. It featured Audrey Hepburn in her first starring role.
- ⇒ 65 years ago, on 26th August 1958 that Ralph Vaughan Williams, British composer, died. Among his famous compositions are: *The Lark Ascending, Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis*, and *A Sea Symphony*.
- ⇒ Also 65 years ago, on 29th August 1958 that Cliff Richard's first single *Move It* was released. It reached second place in the UK charts, and John Lennon would later call it "the first British rock record".
- ⇒ 60 years ago, on 8th August 1963 that the Great Train Robbery took place on the West Coast Main Line at Ledburn, Buckinghamshire. £2.6million was stolen in one of the UK's most infamous robberies. The bulk of the money was never recovered.
- Also 60 years ago, on 28th August 1963 that Dr Martin Luther King Jr, delivered his famous 'I Have a Dream' speech from the steps of the Lincoln Memorial during the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. The civil rights rally was attended by approximately 200,000 supporters.
- ⇒ 25 years ago, on 15th August 1998 that a car bomb in Omagh, Northern Ireland, killed 29 people and injured 370. It was the deadliest act of violence in the 30-year history of the Troubles.
- ⇒ 20 years ago, on 11th August 2003 that NATO took over the command of the international peacekeeping force in Kabul, Afghanistan. It was its first major operation outside of Europe.
- ⇒ 15 years ago, on 1st & 2nd August 2008 that the K2 Disaster took place. 11 mountaineers from several international expeditions died on K2, the world's second-highest mountain. Four others were injured. It was the worst single accident in K2's history.
- ⇒ 10 years ago, on 31st August 2013 that David Frost, British TV presenter and journalist, died. Best known for hosting the satirical series *That Was The Week That Was*, as well as *Breakfast with Frost*, and the game show, *Through the Keyhole*. Also known for his political interviews, including the Nixon interviews.



Remembering Ralph Vaughan Williams

It was 65 years ago, on 26th August 1958, that the British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams died. Among his most famous compositions are *The Lark Ascending, Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis* and *A Sea Symphony*.

Despite increasing deafness, brought on by exposure to gunfire when he served in the Second World War, Vaughan Williams was still composing into his 80s. He died, aged 85, the night before recording sessions began on his Ninth Symphony.

The son of a vicar, the composer – himself an agnostic, although he edited the English Hymnal in 1904 and wrote several hymn tunes – was born in Down Ampney, Gloucestershire, and was related to Charles Darwin and to the potter Josiah Wedgwood. He played violin and piano and was a keen collector of folk songs, the tunes of which he included in many of his compositions.

Vaughan Williams was married twice: first to Adeline Fisher and after her death in 1951 to the poet Ursula Wood, who was an occasional collaborator on his compositions. He was also a lifelong friend of the composer Gustav Holst.

The Lark Ascending – probably Vaughan Williams' most famous piece – was written in 1914, but its premiere was delayed by the First World War. It was eventually given in 1921 by the violinist Marie Hall – for whom Vaughan Williams had written it.

His ashes are interred in Westminster Abbey. His work was almost unique in the variety of music types he employed. It included nine symphonies, concertos for piano, violin, oboe and tuba, five operas, chamber, ballet and film music and songs and song cycles – among other things.


