Theological trainers from all around the country gathered in a very nice hotel near Lake Victoria to benefit from the final part of this training, and to strengthen networks. We were very grateful to Dick and Caroline Seed from South Africa for their expertise. Sarah was also very

Now she only has to raise the funds (15 – 20 million shillings) to put in and process the application. There are only three pieces of paperwork to rewrite, so she feels the end might be in sight.

Simon is praising God that he has received pledges for full funding for the Rooted in Jesus conference in January. This is a great relief, and we are grateful. He has also finished the review of the present five year diocesan plan, and is standing ready to work with Diocesan Staff on putting together the plan for the next five years, and work on a number of issues to enable the diocese to be more self sustaining.

In the college it has been a season of building. The chapel foundations are built, and the walls are going up. You will remember that this has been the gift of the Korean church. Others of you have supported the rebuilding of the piggery, which is now complete, and awaits the arrival of young pigs once we have appointed a pig man, and organised the food supply. We very much hope that in time this will provide much needed funds for the college. Now that we have used up the supplies which the students brought with them our food bill is something over 1 million shillings a week which is not matched by the fees, because most of the students whilst they could bring foodstuffs, couldn't bring all their fees when they came. We survive by the grace of God and the kindness of God's church.

The lay readers have exams at the end of the month and go home on December 4th. It has been a pleasure to get to know some of them: Peter, the chapel 'minister', who helped out by weeding our garden whilst we

were away, and Dickens, the course leader who regularly translates for me in chapel services, and the half a dozen female students with whom Sarah can sit outside the dormitory, and chat at the end of the day occasionally. There are not so many women in leadership positions here, and these ladies tread a fine balance to keep their place without being overawed or over assertive.

Next week we are excited to have visitors from South Carolina, USA who have a long history with the college, and are revisiting for the first time since COVID. They will be staying in the Bishop's Guesthouse for a long weekend. We will be taking them to worship at Christchurch (a town centre church) on Sunday morning. The choir from there have just been competing in the East African choir competition in Tanzania, and came 6th out of thirty-eight entries. Simon's language teacher is part of that choir, and we have enjoyed going to their preparatory concerts leading up to the competition.
