






God is Love and Love never fails



It's February already! Since last month we've endured very cold temperatures, floods and storms and gales. Despite this, our winter so far has been fairly mild and so the daffodils and tulips, snowdrops and hyacinths have been shooting up—a sign of hope for better weather to come. Our world is a delicately balanced ecological system where change in one area affects the rest of it. This is true of our lives as well. War in Eastern Europe and the Middle East can seem far away, but we feel the effect of it and the devastation it brings in many different ways, thousands of miles away, on our tiny island.

How will it end, when the conflict is so ingrained and bitter? Perhaps we need to look to some verses in Paul's letter to the Corinthian Church. He tells them that they need to use their individual (God-given) gifts and talents for the good of everyone, with genuine motivation -love; without that every action is worthless. But if our love for one another is genuine, it cannot fail.

This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day. You'd be forgiven for not immediately seeing a connection between eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, attending a sombre church service on Ash Wednesday and on the same day having a romantic meal, complete with a single red rose and chocolates (not to mention inflated prices for the day)! The link can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love. Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, to love as God loves, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13).



Jesus' experience in the desert hit at all the areas of human vulnerability. Hungry after 40 days without food, He was tempted to turn stones into bread. When we are hungry (or lacking something in our lives), our resolve is weakened. We give in to that longing, despite knowing it's not always good for us. It's the same spiritually. We can make New Year's Resolutions to read our Bibles more, pray more, attend church more, but very quickly we can be distracted by what may appear to be more pleasurable activities, but rarely live up to expectations.



Satan tempted Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is an expression of our love for God. When we sell out for anything less, when we make idols of material things, our business or careers, or even human relationships, we are losing focus. Worship is not just for an hour on Sunday mornings. It is the glue of our relationship with our Creator, expressed in our everyday lives.

Finally, Jesus was tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the top of the Temple. 'If you really are who you say you are, then God will save you from hurting yourself'. Jesus didn't need to perform theatrical stunts in order to prove who he was. Real love for God does not put Him to the test, but wants to follow His plan for us and the world, trusting that it's the best plan. When Jesus performed miracles and signs and wonders during his ministry, it was to point people to God, never to show off and make himself look good.

Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and that he was martyred on 14th February. There are several legends attached to him. One is that the Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives (!) and so had attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married Christian couples in secret, which is why today we celebrate love for one another on this day.

Many of us give up chocolate or alcohol or even TV soaps during Lent as a form of abstinence or even proof of will-power! Other decide to do something practical or donate money saved to a good cause. Whatever you do, it won't hurt to let your mind wander to considering how you would define Ultimate Love. You might be surprised at what you really think!

What's the Big idea?

Seeing the Bigger picture—Books in the Bible

Genesis.

As the title suggests, Genesis is about beginnings. It records the creation of the heavens and the earth and human beings; marriage and family; sin's effect on society and the world. The following chapters record God's dealings with Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph, and their families. In this story of the Patriarchs (or Fathers) we see God establishing a people called to bless the world, as He blesses them.

The book of Genesis is key to understanding the whole Bible. It is really about relationships; the relationships between God and the created order, God and human beings, and between human beings themselves. Man has been created in the image of God, so that he can relate to God in a personal way: 'God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them' (1:27). However, Genesis plots how this relationship was broken by sin, when Adam and Eve disobeyed God, resulting in the fall of human beings and the created order. By creating people with free will, God risked the possibility that they might reject Him. This is inherent in His love for human beings.

In Genesis, God enters into covenants with the world (the rainbow following the flood) and with Abraham and his descendents (circumcision), pledging His love and faithfulness to them and calling them to respond to Him in faith. It reminds us that God is fundamental to living. Without a sense of the centrality of God's place in our lives, we can never get our lives right.

Exodus

Exodus, the second book of the Old Testament means departure, reminding us that Israel's flight out of slavery in Egypt is the major focus of the book.

Exodus is a book of two halves! The first part is the story of an oppressed people who are delivered from slavery into a life of freedom. The second half consists of detailed instructions about the life and worship of God's people. The book introduces us to their *salvation* or *deliverance*, as story. God's promises to Abraham are fulfilled as the people journey to the Promised Land. He also renews His covenant with them at Sinai, expressed in the Ten Commandments.

At the heart of Exodus is the person of God Himself. In chapter 3 God reveals His name as YHWH or 'I am who I am' to Moses. This is the name by which God is known throughout the Old Testament, expressed in the title 'the LORD'. To know God's name is to know Him, as well as His character ie His justice, truthfulness, mercy, faithfulness and holiness. He is the God who controls history, delivering the people out of Egypt, while the death of the Passover lamb points us to Jesus' death on the cross (1 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promises of help remain true for us today: 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today' Exodus 14:13

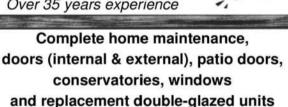


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Letter from Westminster

Last month, in common with many parts of the country, rivers and waterways in South Shropshire including the Severn, Teme, Corve and Worfe broke their banks in places. For some poor house-holds affected by the rising flood waters, this was the second time in 12 months they had flooded, including some of those I visited in the immediate aftermath of Storm Henk. 2023 was not only the warmest year on record globally, but here in the UK we also saw higher levels of rainfall, more persistently from September to December. This followed a year of unusual drought conditions in 2022.

This goes to show climate change is impacting us here in South Shropshire, and highlights the importance of managing water resources and treatment, to ensure safe drinking supply, stewardship of our waterways, as well as ensuring we have good treatment to reduce risks from our sewage systems being overwhelmed, as they have been.

Managing our water systems is a topic on which I have focussed during my time in Parliament since the last General Election and as Chairman of the Environmental Audit Committee. Last month I hosted an event in Parliament for the Chartered Institution of Water and Environmental Management, which was launching its new independent review "A Fresh Water Future", with recommendations for the next government, of whatever complexion, to maintain improvement of water infrastructure and regulation high up the agenda.

I have also been supporting my neighbouring MPs in our River Severn Caucus to seek government support for a holistic catchment wide response to manage flooding of the River Severn valley, to manage excessive rain levels from the Welsh hills through to the Severn Estuary. This is an ambitious £500m set of measures, which would help communities across Shropshire by reducing the flow of water, and the risk of localised flooding.

I am also pleased to be able to report by the end of December the government was able to announce that all Combined Sewer Overflows and treatment works were now fitted with event duration monitors (only 7% had them installed in 2010 - now 100%) so that comprehensive data will now be available to water companies, their regulators, and the public when sewage spills occur. This was something I was determined to push through in my Private Members Bill on sewage pollution, which the government then picked up in the Environment Act 2021. While I warmly welcome this progress, the key is to upgrade our water infrastructure to prevent sewage spills damaging aquatic life in our waterways in the first place.

To that end, the Government has a 25-year Plan for Water, under which water companies are together developing plans which amount to £96bn of investment over the next 5 years, once approved by Ofwat. Severn Trent is at the forefront, having pledged a record £12.9bn investment, with improvement of at least 562 storm overflows, as they try to meet the Government's target five years early.

Looking around at the impact of Storm Henk last month, it was clear the impact would not only be for households and business, but also for farmers whose fields had been submerged, with grants up to £25,000 to farmers whose land had flooded and damaged crops. There has also been recent progress in bringing water management more holistically into the wider DEFRA support mechanisms for agriculture, with the latest iteration of the Sustainable Farming Incentive published in January including 15 new measures to help farmers manage water flows and reduce the impact of farming practices on water courses and nature.

There is also further government support available for homes and businesses, provided certain thresholds are met. I raised Shropshire's case with the Flooding Minister in the House of Commons last month, to seek to ensure the Flood Recovery Framework scheme is activated in Shropshire. In order to do so, it is vital that for any floods in in South Shropshire every homeowner affected informs Shropshire Council if their home or business has been flooded.

Flooding is a terrible experience for anyone who has to live through it, and it is right that we do what we can to mitigate the impacts and adapt to reduce the risk for those communities where it is becoming increasingly likely as climate change becomes a reality.

Our first Parish Council meeting of 2024 took place in new surroundings as our usual meeting room is no more! If you've visited the Severn Centre recently you won't have failed to notice the building work being done to relocate the medical centre to where the library used to be is progressing at great pace. It's fantastic to see how quickly things have got started and it's a positive sign the project will be complete as quickly as it can be and we'll be enjoying our new medical facilities before we know it.

The relocation of the library was something I was keen to understand from the very start of the project. The presence of a library service in the village is crucial and it was imperative it remained in the Severn Centre. The new location is the room which was being used by the cafe and it appears to be suitable from what I have seen. I was pleased to note that input from the village was sought through a survey, I believe the feedback will be invaluable in determining how the library will function in its new home

January has proven to be a busy month for the Parish Council. We diligently drafted, discussed and approved our budget for 2024/25 and our Police Working Group had its inaugural meeting. Policing in the village is a focal point for me, and I am optimistic that the working group will serve as an efficient mechanism for engaging with law enforcement in the future. Unfortunately, the issue of crime came to the forefront this month with damage to one of our CCTV cameras, possibly linked to a serious robbery within the village. We are actively collaborating with our technical partner to restore the camera promptly and will continue liaising with the police to assist in their inquiries.

Looking ahead to 2024 I'm excited to continue the positive work the Parish Council has been undertaking, aiming to make a real difference in the village. Our Village Maintenance Group will concentrate on ensuring Highley is at its best, including organising the annual flowers and we are all eagerly anticipating The Carnival in July.





O pilgrim souls is this your day? Who strive for things above Your blissful hope for by and by That your dream is God, is Love.


The world may mock, but undismayed Your toilsome path may go, Few oak and ash shed their shade Along Borle Brook we all know.



But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit' (vv. 9-10 NKJV). The Holy Spirit compensates for our sensory limits by enabling us to conceive things we cannot perceive with our five senses. Think of Him as a sixth sense. That sense must be cultivated, matured, and fine-tuned. And that can only happen when we spend time meditating in the Scriptures and fellowshipping with God in prayer. Until we are awakened by the Holy Spirit, we are unaware of our need for God, of the spiritual warfare that is being waged all around us, and of what God is doing all around us.

One night Jacob had a dream in which God appeared to him and said, 'I am with you and will keep you wherever you go' (Genesis 28:15 NKJV). When he awakened the next morning, Jacob said, 'Surely the LORD is in this place, and I did not know *it*...This *is* none other than the house of God, and this *is* the gate of heaven!' (Genesis 28:16-17 NKJV). Jacob went to sleep and woke up in the *same place*, but he woke up a *different person*. After his wake-up call, Jacob saw God every place he looked.

Today ask God for a spiritual epiphany. Pray, 'Lord, show me what You want me to see, teach me what You want me to know, lead me step-by-step in the path of Your perfect will.' That's a prayer God will answer!

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Snowdrops and Salvation

Thoughts from Kinlet Churchyard, from Alan Mansell

As we move steadily away from the darkest days of winter by early February the effect of the daily extra couple of minutes of light is starting to be quite noticeable. Some bulbs are starting to show themselves, snowdrops being the first. National Trust sites may urge us to visit their "snowdrop walks". Attingham Park is usually one. We may also know of other places where there is usually a fine display.

Snowdrops were often referred to as Candlemas Bells. On February 2nd the church celebrates Candlemas when we remember the presentation of the baby Jesus at the Temple as recorded in the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 2. The devout Simeon sees the Lord's Christ, as had been promised to him. His words on seeing the salvation that God had prepared for all peoples is known as the "Nunc dimittis" or "Song of Simeon". It is still often used in church services.

Kinlet Church has been a place of worship and prayer for centuries. Last February, when we were yet to see the white of a solitary snowflake, (though we had a little a bit later on), the snowdrops there were, I felt, truly remarkable. Later this month we move into Lent; a period of reflection and preparation for Easter, when on Easter Sunday (March 31st this year), we celebrate Christ's great victory. In these worrying, warming years perhaps the snowdrops can be a reminder to us of how sure this is.

The white of winter's snow we've killed For our greed has temperature raised, Yet God's will cannot be defeated For round an ancient store of praise, Resurrected Love rings loud and clear Each bright bloom His victory tells, Winter's churchyard is transfigured By a peal of Candlemas Bells.

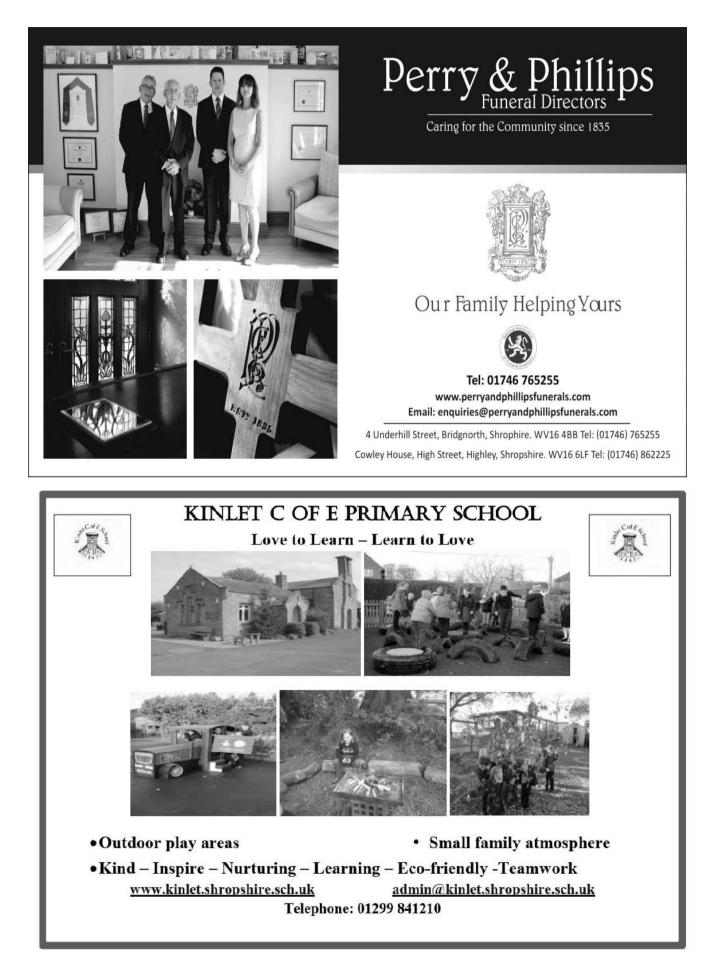

This week I have focused on the 'veganuary' movement, that tries to encourage people to make changes in their diet, and swap meat for plants. Eating less meat and dairy can reduce your saturated fat intake, and your carbon footprint, so it is definitely worth considering, even if you aren't going to cut it out completely - **Alastair**

Information taken from the website 'The World Counts':

With 8.1 billion humans on our planet, eating plants instead of meat is a win-win for the world. Whether you like eating meat everyday, or just once in a while, it is a very "inefficient" food source. It requires more energy, water and land to produce meat than any other food source. For example, 1 hectare of rice or potato cropland can feed between 19 and 22 people in one year. For beef or lamb, 1 hectare can feed only 1 or 2 people. The world's population is increasing and the world's cropland area is shrinking. By 2050, we may have less than 0.1 hectares per person on the planet. At the same time, we also need to give more land back to nature so that our ecosystems can recover.

Meat consumption contributes to global food crisis

Almost HALF of the world's harvest is fed to animals. Globally, 90 percent of the ever-increasing soybean harvest goes for animal feed. Reduced meat consumption is needed to feed a world population of 10 billion people by 2050. It would be much more efficient to eat a soybean directly than feed it to an animal and eat the animal! Meat production is also a large source of greenhouse gas emissions and thereby plays a major role in climate change.


So, let's try swapping meat for plants and enjoy a meat free supper! – Katlyn


Cooked legumes such as beans, chickpeas and lentils can be swapped for a lot of ground beef recipes.

Mushrooms are one of the most popular vegetables to replace meat, due to their savoury, umani flavour and meaty texture.

Nutrient and protein-rich nuts such as walnuts and pecans can turn into a delicious meat substitute.

Seitan, tempeh and tofu can all marinate well and take on flavour and provide a real 'meaty' texture in your cooking.




