

Why Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent. Lent is the period of 40 days leading up to Easter, when Jesus' earthly ministry ended on the cross, fulfilled through his resurrection, three days later.

Lent is a time for remembering the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert after his baptism, preparing for the ministry which he had come to exercise.

Lent is a time of abstinence (holding back from temptation). We remember Jesus fasting in the desert and being tempted by Satan. When we are tired or hungry or thirsty, we can be weak, especially if someone offers us the very thing we are trying not to eat/drink/do/think about. Jesus resisted temptation and came away stronger, ready to do the work that God had for him and fulfil his destiny.

The ashes are symbolic. We were created from dust (Genesis 2:7) and we return to dust (the words of committal at our burial. (Genesis 3:19). On Ash Wednesday we remember all of this and are remind of our own mortality and our need to be reconciled properly to our Creator, God. If you are thinking about any of this and want to talk it over, do contact one of the clergy. Contact details are on page 36.



Candlemas



The 2nd February marks the festival of Candlemas in the Church's calendar. This is forty days after Christmas and has its roots Jewish law as set down in Leviticus. A woman had to present herself thirty-three days after the circumcision of a male child, to sacrifice a pair of doves or pigeons and a lamb and so become ritually clean. In our Bibles, St Luke describes how firstly Jesus was circumcised and named and then Mary subsequently came to the temple with Joseph and Jesus to be purified. This has given us the stories of Simeon and Anna, the two elderly individuals

who attended the temple on a daily basis and who recognised that Jesus was the Messiah when Mary brought him to her purification.

We know that back in the late 4th century, the equivalent of Candlemas was celebrated by the church in Jerusalem; this was a major event for those who lived in the city. It may be that the

festival originated in Jerusalem and spread to other areas of the church. It now formally marks the end of the Christmas season, as the church changes gear and moves through Lent to Easter. The name "Candlemas" comes from the custom in some churches of blessing all the candles that will be used throughout the rest of the year. More recently, it has given us Christingle; a merging of the theme of candles with the proclamation of Christ to the world. However, even within the church, Candlemas is often at best a footnote; a far cry from the major festival that so excited the Christians of Jerusalem round 390. I had to check to make sure I had remembered correctly what exactly we celebrate at this time. Christmas seems a long time ago and a lot of what we do at Candlemas seems to duplicate things that also happen at other times.



Perhaps to make more of Candlemas, we could go back to Luke's Gospel. Luke uses the presentation of Jesus and the purification of Mary to close his account of Jesus's infancy. Apart from an interlude in Jerusalem when Jesus was twelve, we have thirty hidden years, when we do not know exactly what Jesus did, until he presents himself to be baptised by John. But in these hidden years, we do know that much must have been going on within the mind of Jesus, of how he learnt what the Father required of him, the Son; how he, the Son, discovered the power of the Holy Spirit. It was not public, it was not spectacular, it was an inner journey. But it was vital for Jesus and it is also for us. Perhaps we can mark the time between now and Lent by a similar process of inner reflection; even by lighting a candle from time to time, to stare at the flame and in the stillness, wait on God in the silence of eternity.


While sitting under the bank

'A Pair of Blue Eyes' by Thomas Hardy


I heard a noise that startled me



As with Glazeley, we had good attendances at our Christmas services. We battled with the weather for the outdoor carol singing at Lincoln Fields this year, but still had 11 people (as well as plenty of mince pies and mulled wine!). On Christmas Day, we had 20 people in church; you have to go back 20 years to find a comparable Christmas Day congregation. Many thanks to everyone who helped decorate the church or with refreshments at the carol singing. It is really encouraging to see good numbers supporting us!



The observant may note some repairs have been made to the gate of the churchyard. When the hedge was cut back in the autumn, this revealed that the gate post had rotted and was only being held in place by the hedge. With this being cut back, it was now in a precarious position. Plan A was to source a new gate post, whilst temporarily supporting the existing post with stakes driven in either side of it. However, whilst attempting to drive in the said stakes, it became apparent that the post had been set in concrete and so removing this is a serious undertaking. In the absence of a pneumatic drill to break up the concrete, the post has now been supported by stakes and tied back to the hedge. It is literally a lash-up, but it is the best your intrepid assistant curate can manage. Colonel Wainwright has acquired a new toy: a snow blower, of sufficient power that I believe it could clear the Antarctic. He kindly volunteered to clear the paths around the church. Working outwards from the church door, the path to the church soon became snow free. We shall continue to triumph heroically over adversity and return home after Mattins, feeling we have proved our Christian commitment by being utterly uncomfortable.

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Letter from Westminster

Local planning issues often fill my postbag and can be a source of significant concern to local residents affected by an application and rightly so.

Planning issues are at the heart of our communities, permitting the very homes we live in, the schools our children go to, the hospital we visit and the roads that take us there. That is why reforming the way our outdated and bureaucratic planning system works is so important. Many people complain to me that it is not currently delivering for the people locally that use it or the communities that need good homes to live in.



Most people recognise that we need to build more houses, especially affordable homes, across the country. In Shropshire sadly many young families are forced into renting for longer than they want to and struggle to find suitable homes when they can afford a mortgage. But that also means we need to build the right homes in the right places.

The Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill which finished its passage through the Commons before Christmas, recognises that it is communities themselves who are best placed to make decisions on local development. The Bill will modernise the planning system for the 21st century and give residents a louder voice to ensure that development reflects community preferences. Under the reformed system, local plans will be given more weight and the plan making process will be sped up.

This will not only give communities like ours in South Shropshire more certainty that the right homes will be built in the right places but will also give more assurance that areas of environmental importance will be respected in decisions on planning applications and appeals and crucially, will remove centrally imposed house building targets.

The legislation puts communities at its heart. It will introduce a requirement for local planning authorities to produce design codes for their areas, which will have full weight in planning decision making. Digitising the planning system will make it easier for communities to access the system and help groups typically underrepresented in planning decisions to make their voices heard in their area. This compliments ongoing pilots which are testing new digital initiatives, such as online 3D maps and QR code systems to enable residents to interact with the system in new ways.

A new Infrastructure Levy will also be introduced to help fund the schools, GP surgeries and road improvements needed, which has been a regular concern in local planning applications in South Shropshire. The levy will be set locally to allow Shropshire Council to tailor it to our local circumstances. There will be a consultation on the workings of this new levy, which I was pleased to have confirmed will also be available to ensure water supply and treatment improvements can benefit.

The Government remains wholeheartedly committed to the benefits of neighbourhood planning. The new Bill will strengthen neighbourhood planning and give these plans greater weight in planning decisions. The legislation will also help even more people to get involved in neighbourhood planning by introducing a new tool for parish councils and neighbourhood forums called a neighbourhood priorities statement. This will allow communities to identify priorities and preferences for their area which the local authority will be obliged to take into account when preparing its local plan.

It is our neighbourhoods that feel the impact of planning most immediately. I am hopeful that these reforms will genuinely empower people from all backgrounds to get more involved in decisions that shape where we live.

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Highley Parish Council

Last month I mentioned that we will have some road works that will affect Highley and surrounding areas. Although we still do not yet have the full details I can confirm that New Road will be closed from 13th February for a maximum of 3 weeks. This will be 24 hours a day, whilst circa 120 trees are removed. It will be closed just after Coomby's Farm and up to the entrance to Borle Mill. There will be no HGV access into Highley from the Kinlet side, Borle Mill will be one way only into the village; Netherton Lane will be one way towards New England / Hagg Corner; New England / Bind Lane will be for access only and Covert Lane will be one way from Sutton to the B4363 for those travelling to Cleobury, Bewdley and Kidderminster etc. HGV vehicles can access Highley but cannot go through the road works.

Diamond Buses will run the Shuttle Service; we will advise timetables as soon as we receive them. Shropshire Council will write to businesses and residents where the most disruption will be.

On the 3^{rd of} February we have a Family Information Drop-in day at the Severn Centre from 2pm to 5pm, some of the teams below will be there to support Highley. Once the details are finalised we will advertise further, closer to the time.



So, he repeatedly asks, 'Can you hear me now?' The ad was designed to convey the message that this particular phone company delivers a high-quality signal and doesn't drop calls. When your phone drops a call, you know it. And what's your immediate reaction? Annoyance? Frustration? Anger?

In Everyone Communicates, Few Connect, Dr John Maxwell writes: 'When I interact with people... I know I've connected when I sense extra effort – people go the extra mile; unsolicited appreciation – they say positive things; unguarded openness – they demonstrate trust; increased communication – they express themselves more readily; enjoyable experiences – they feel good about what they're doing; emotional bondedness – they display a connection on an emotional level; positive energy – their emotional "batteries" are charged by being together;...unconditional love – they are accepting without reservation. Anytime I interact with people and I see evidence of these signals, I know I'm connecting. I've learned what it takes to connect...and...to gauge when I'm succeeding. How are you doing when it comes to connecting? When you interact one-on-one with someone important in your life, do you receive these signals?...Even if connecting with others isn't something you're good at today, you can learn how to do it and become better tomorrow.' But first, you must genuinely care about the person you are trying to connect with. That's why St Paul writes,

'May the Lord make your love increase and overflow.'

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

Update regarding Highley Medical Centre

Following the news that Highley Medical Centre has formally given notice to end their General Practice contract (announced Tuesday 15 November 2022), NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin has been leading urgent and extensive work with a range of partners.

The following update has been shared to outline progress to date and to reassure patients and residents of Highley that the continuation of a GP service in the area is of utmost importance and that every effort is being made to ensure a smooth transition of services.

As we have previously said, the primary focus of this work is to secure an option that sustains GP provision in the village and since November a scoping exercise to identify appropriate opportunities has been carried out.

Although we are not able to share details of this presently, we will share the outcome of the scoping exercise when we are able and will provide clear guidance to patients on what, if anything, they need to do before 31 March 2023 when the current contract ends.

Please be assured that no patient will be left without access to GP services and if patients wish to register elsewhere, they are free to do so. However, we are committed to ensuring the continuation of GP services in the village and at this point are optimistic a suitable solution will be found.

As we have stated before, the support of the local community and our partners is very important and we hope that people feel assured that this work is a priority and that NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin sees this, despite the short-term disruption, as an opportunity for the area.

In the meantime, patient care will not be affected until the GP contract ends on 31 March 2023 and NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin will co-ordinate regular updates, working with partners, to ensure people are kept fully informed.

Recipe of the month - Alastair

We enjoyed a quick and easy plant based supper the other day, perfect for when you get home and want to eat promptly!

You will need:

- Tin of chickpeas (already cooked)
- A leafy green vegetable (purple sprouting broccoli or cauliflower work well)
- Some form of cream (oat cream, creme fraiche or even double cream)
- Naan bread
- Curry powder and garam masala

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
