



Service and Sacrifice

'Well done, my good and faithful servant. In you I am well pleased.'

As the Queen entered into her eternal rest, however you want to imagine that, I firmly believe that God welcomed her with those words.

Like so many others, royalists or not, I have been struck by the response of many thousands (probably millions) of people who have publicly mourned the death of Queen Elizabeth II. I was surprised by my own feelings of sadness and emptiness, particularly during the 10 days of mourning, when every day something new was being revealed about her long and fruitful life.

Our nation mourned, and so did the world. Media presenters commented on how unusual it was for such an outpouring of genuine sadness, respect and grief from leaders and ordinary folk alike from so many countries across the world.

What was it that provoked this widespread reaction?

Did it have something to do with a conscious or unconscious recognition that she had lived up to the promises she had made as a young woman. Yes, she was born into a privileged life. But with privilege comes responsibility. She took her Coronation vows seriously and kept them, even when it meant that she was torn between family and country.

How many of us can say that we have continuously lived a life of sacrifice and service, in the way that she did?

I was struck by the photos of a rainbow across Buckingham Palace and also Windsor Castle. How very poignant. Rainbows are biblically a sign of the covenant that God made with Noah. A promise that He would not again destroy those he had created, as had happened with the Great Flood. The flood occurred because mankind had become so wicked, that (the bible tells us) God regretted creating the world.

We could easily feel that the world is very wicked today. Yet God shows us, through the lives of others, that there is a better way to live. Words that came up time and time again in tributes to our late Queen were kindness, goodness, patience, love, peace, graciousness, sacrifice, self-control. These are all fruits of the Holy Spirit.

It doesn't take much to spread a little kindness. It takes a bit more maybe to be gracious when you want to respond more harshly. But thoughtfulness and acting for the greater good always has a better outcome.

Another unusual feature of the reporting on the Queen's long life and reign was how much her personal faith upheld her through the pressures of her role and also family troubles—and she certainly had her fair share of those!

If you've ever read the book of Proverbs in the Bible, you'll know that there is a lot said about wisdom and self-control. One such verse reads

'The tongues of the wise use knowledge well, but the mouth of fools pour out foolishness.' Proverbs 15:2

Our late Queen understood this well and thought carefully before she spoke, particularly in contentious circumstances. Her response of *'Recollections may vary'* following **that** media broadcast will probably go down in history. And always, she was reaching out in love, despite family differences. We, and the world, could do well to emulate that response to disagreements and potential division. We cannot always give others what they want or demand, but we can assure them of our continuing love, despite our differences.

St Mary's, Billingsley

Harvest this year at Billingsley took the form of two events. On Thursday the 8th September, a group met in the orchard opposite the church to celebrate the fruit and "wild harvest". We were picking up on a number of traditions connected with orchards, that start with "wassailing" immediately after Christmas when a crowd would gather to drink and shout loudly to scare away evil spirits from the trees, through Easter and May to harvest itself. We listened to the Gloucester Wassail Carol, read a collection of apple-themed verses from the Bible, sang a

hymn, scattered bread for the birds and blessed the trees by pouring cider over their roots. We drank the rest of the cider and retired to church to eat apple-cake and apple tarts. Ellen also provided the equivalent of the corn-dolly, the "apple Queen"; a doll with a crab-apple for a head (see photo). This was followed on the Sunday by the traditional harvest festival in church, again with refreshments afterwards. We did hope to have a guest preacher but she had to cancel as she was needed to take prayers for the Queen in Bridgnorth; we hope she can come in October. We had almost 20 people at our two services.

The orchard service took place only a few minutes after the news was released of the death of the Queen. We tolled the bell just before the service and said prayers for the late Queen and King Charles during the service; these were repeated at Harvest itself.

Our final evening service this year will be on Sunday 9th October at 6pm, when we hope Jane Peeler will be able to talk about her work as an Anna Chaplain. This is a form of ministry that specifically looks to the spiritual needs of the elderly; it takes its name from Anna, the old woman and prophetess who acknowledged the infant Jesus as Messiah when he was taken to the temple to be circumcised. Anyone interested in pastoral care for the elderly is welcome to attend.

St Bartholomew's, Glazeley

Glazeley church had a busy service on Sunday 18th September. It was harvest festival but also it was a year since our former organist June Davenhill died. June was the wife of Harry Davenhill of Picklesbatch; together they were dedicated to keeping the church open. June's great passion was music; she was a founder of Pelsall Ladies Choir, who she often brought to sing at Glazeley and she also

regularly played our organ. Daughter Rachael now follows in her footsteps and her grand-daughter read music at University. The family wanted a memorial for June and so at our service we dedicated a photo of her and a table; ultimately we want to place this next to the organ where we will put a plaque to June. We were joined by June's daughters, grand-daughters, sister and brotherin-law; Rachael played the organ for us whilst younger daughter Gill spoke about June's life and service to the church. We had a congregation of over 20 and enjoyed cake, pork-pie, tea and sherry after the service; Glazeley knows how to enjoy itself... We also had a lovely turn out at our monthly "Breakfast at The Down"; 38 turned up for the fabulous breakfast put on by Steve & his team. There were plenty of raffle prizes thank you to all who donated them & £130 was raised for the church funds.

My dear Nephew Darren

After all these years, who would have believed it: to have my own book printed! I must admit, I had imagined a leather-bound volume with gold leaf lettering on the spine – perhaps even titled 'Volume One', implying future delights when further work would appear. A paperback, held together with glue was a slight disappointment. The publisher's reason for a print run of 50, saying that it meant fewer would have to be dumped in cut-price bookshops, was not what I had expected either.

He seemed to think that my commentary on Eusebius's tables for cross-referencing the gospels, as explained in his letter to Carpianus, would not have mass interest. While I concede it will be unlikely to dent the sales of Harry Potter, and that I am unlikely to be involved in negotiating the film rights, I had hoped for slightly more enthusiasm for this stride forward in global knowledge.

The excitement of the book launch and signing was also tempered when only the bishop arrived, expecting a free copy, so he could mark it for theological errors. My suggestion that he take a copy to colour it in did not go down well. I suspect I will not now be asked to deliver a paper on it at the next clergy conference.

I was briefly excited when several parishioners came into the shop. But it turned out that one wanted to book a baptism with me, and another wanted to complain that at his recent wedding, I had nearly married the best man to the bride. I was tempted to tell him that the time may come when he wished that I had, but decided that would be another sale lost.

I could not even console myself with a free drink. The publisher had only brought two bottles of that particular white wine, of unknown origin, that seems specially reserved for book launches and retirement parties. I suspect it derives less from a vineyard and more from a laboratory. One bottle he kept for himself and the other disappeared after my Confirmation class came in to ask whether the book would be serialised on TV.

In the end, I bought all 50 copies myself, placed a note in the bookshop window saying that, due to exceptional demand, the print run had been entirely sold out. It has also solved the annual problem of Christmas presents; in your case, a second copy will probably arrive for your birthday too.

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Letter from Westminster

Last month, we reflected with a mixture of great sadness and huge sense of loss, but also remembered with great joy the inspiration which Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II gave in devoting her life to the service of others.

She set an example not just to those in public life, but to all of us: how to behave, how to help others, how to bring people together and make people happy. She was the mother of the Nation, the founder of the Commonwealth and the senior stateswoman of the globe. The world shares in our grief.

Sir Winston Churchill, her first of 15 Prime Ministers, heralded her Accession to the throne as launching "a golden age" - "a signal for a brightening salvation of the human scene". And so it proved in so many areas of human endeavour and achievement by her and her subjects over these past 70 years.

We shall probably all remember where we were when we heard the news of Her Majesty's death. Although she was 96 this still came as a lightning bolt of shock in the midst of thunderstorms raging across her Kingdom that day.

I was with members of the Environmental Audit Committee, at a half-full reservoir in Cornwall surrounded by trees.

This seemed strangely fitting, giving the commitment Her Majesty showed to the environment. Through her love of nature, she and her devoted husband Prince Philip the late Duke of Edinburgh undoubtedly planted the seed for their family's enthusiasm in championing nature and leading the crusade to combat climate change, decades before this became fashionable.

Only last November in her message to international leaders and delegates attending COP26 she said: "The time for words has now moved to the time for action".

But it was her love of trees that will be a lasting physical legacy. I suspect she planted more than anyone else in public life around the globe.

The Platinum Jubilee Queen's Canopy has seen a million trees planted this year alone in her honour, which will be a lasting reminder of her for decades if not hundreds of years to come.

Her only official visit to the Ludlow constituency was in the year after her Golden Jubilee, when she came by royal train to Telford and visited Much Wenlock with Prince Philip to take in the Wenlock Olympian Games, an early precursor to her role in London 2012.

She then showed that her priorities lay with her people, by having lunch in the Discovery Centre in Craven Arms, rather than the gourmet delights of Ludlow. She went on to do a walkabout in the Market Square in Ludlow, where thousands turned out to welcome the first visit by a reigning



monarch in more than 300 years. Most visits by earlier monarchs before that had been at the head of an army.

My sincere condolences to the Royal Family on the loss of their, and our, matriarch and monarch.





An Update from the Parish Council

There are many topics to cover this month, but most of which are lost in the sad news that we have lost our Queen Elizabeth II, who has been head of the UK and Commonwealth for 70 years and has also been a major influence across the world. She lived a remarkable life and was so popular wherever she went. 

Energy whilst cooking - Alastair

It's a topic that is on most peoples' minds at the moment. How do I reduce my energy consumption to reduce my bills? Well, here are a few tips for you whilst you are in the kitchen:

- The microwave is generally the most efficient way to heat up and cook food it's always quicker and its smaller size (as opposed to the oven) means that the heat is more focused on whatever's being cooked. Opt for this appliance whenever possible. I even boiled potatoes in it the other day.
- Slow cookers and air fryers are less efficient than microwaves, but more efficient than using a hob or an oven.
- Batch cook where possible, use the right-sized pan with a lid, simmer rather than boil, and of course fill the kettle with the right amount of water before you have a hot drink.

Recipe of the month - Nancy

Falafel is a delicious, protein packed treat, perfect for a quick supper or lunch. Gently fry up an onion in some sunflower oil, once softened add some chopped garlic. After a minute, mash together with a can of drained chickpeas, a tsp of cumin, a tsp of coriander and some mixed herbs or parsley. Add a beaten egg (or flax seed) and form into patties. Fry the patties in some vegetable oil and serve in pitta bread or with couscous. You could use the microwave to warm the chickpea mixture so you spend less time frying on the hob!

What the new prime minister means for our planet - Mike

We're pleased to hear the new Prime Minister's support for 'all renewables' and look forward to seeing how the government will lift barriers to on-shore solar and wind. These are cheap, with electricity from renewable energy now nine times cheaper than from gas, quick to build and are overwhelmingly popular with the public.

However, new gas and oil developments will take a lot longer to develop and will have no meaningful impact on bills. Instead, they will send more planet-heating pollution into our atmosphere. We need more people to think about the future for our children, and speak up to protect this planet. The people in power need to hear from us and get a grip on our future!


