


A Prayer for 2024



James the Least of All On how to run your Diary for 2024.

My dear Nephew Darren

Letter from Westminster



Happy New Year to everyone across South Shropshire!

This is the last New Year message I shall send as your MP. While that fact is a little hard to write, after almost twenty years as your MP, it does help remind me that this is my final year to achieve as much as possible for the Ludlow Constituency before I step down. I am under no illusion about the challenges the country faces, but I am also aware that the right approach from government can make a huge difference to people's lives.

Continuing to bear down on inflation must be a priority for the government again this year, as it is effectively a stealth tax, making life more difficult for family household budgets. This time last year, at the end of 2022, inflation was at 10.5 per cent, but thanks to the difficult decisions taken last year, inflation has been more than halved to 4.6 per cent in October. In his Autumn Statement in November the Chancellor was able to find some scope for tax cuts.

To support the lowest paid, this year the government is delivering the largest ever cash increase to the National Living Wage, boosting it from April to £11.44 an hour. That is a 9.8 per cent increase, benefiting 2.7 million workers by an average £1,800 a year.

Locally, I am determined to see the Hospital Transformation Programme to improve Shropshire's acute hospitals get underway. Successfully campaigning for £312m for our hospitals was one of my proudest achievements as your MP, and I do not wish to see this project become a political football, with patients missing out on better care. Initial enabling works are due to begin soon this year.

As readers will know, the health of our rivers and waterways is something about which I care deeply. Following my campaigning with Severn Trent Water, 2024 will see multimillion pound upgrade works to improve the quality of the River Teme around Ludlow, to help deliver bathing quality water between Knighton and Tenbury Wells. I look forward to seeing this project delivered, and the lessons learned begin to be applied elsewhere in South Shropshire.

As part of my wider environmental work, I am looking to ensure the Environmental Audit Committee delivers important guidance to government through our inquiries this year. We are focussed on improving the electricity grid to help decarbonise the economy and making natural capital work to improve nature and biodiversity. My time as Chair of the Committee has been a personal highlight of this Parliament, and I wish to deliver impactful reports in this my last year heading the Committee.

I love seeing so many people in the same place demonstrating what a fantastic village Highley is and I thoroughly enjoyed being able to take to the stage and recognise the contribution made to our village by the winners of the annual Highley Civic Awards. In addition to the fun activities available on the day we were also able to raise almost £1,000 for our chosen charitable cause — the family of Albie-Jon, a local child currently receiving treatment for Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia.

The Parish Council's December meeting was quieter (and shorter!) than usual as we all begin to wind down for Christmas. One area of focus for the Council is our working groups. These groups consist of Parish Councillors but can also include members of the public and their purpose is to allow the full council to delegate responsibilities and to actually 'get things done'. We'll be looking to publicise the work of these groups so keep an eye out for more details!

The big news in December was of course the confirmation that Highley Medical Centre will soon be housed within The Severn Centre. This project has been going on for most of 2023 so it was brilliant to find out the work will indeed be going ahead and actually may have already started by the time you read this!

As I mentioned last month, for the first time in a long time we have no vacancies on The Parish Council and as you'll see from the photo below, our December meeting was lovely and full!

I'd like to wish everyone in Highley a Happy New Year and all the best for 2024.





Winning the battle over apathy

'Stir up the gift of God which is in you.'

Paul told Timothy, 'Stir up the gift of God which is in you through the laying on of my hands.' That Scripture means, even though you're gifted, you can become apathetic if you don't keep doing the right things. 'Therefore we must give the more earnest heed to the things we have heard, lest we drift away' (Hebrews 2:1 NKJV). The word 'drift' is not only slow and subtle, it's deadly. Let's look at two of the things that can rob you of your passion, enthusiasm, motivation, and focus.

- 1) Lack of goals. 'Without a vision the people perish' (see Proverbs 29:18). What used to enthuse you? What destroyed your interest in it? Is it a desire you could revive? Put it down in writing. Ignore the potential cost or reasons it might not work. Just indulge your mind in the luxury of feeling optimistic and excited about something, even a small thing.



Thank you to all those who have supported us with monetary gifts throughout the year.



Sustainable Highley

We can make Highley sustainable!

Keeping heat in your home - Dale


Energy saving tips are always welcome in the winter. It takes a long time to make your home perform as efficiently as possible. Maybe this year, try and write a list of a few achievable and affordable things that you could do to reduce your home's carbon footprint. You might want to consider radiators:

Radiators can play a big part in saving energy throughout your home. One quick way to save energy is to turn down the radiators in the rooms you aren't using. If you've got thermostatic valves on your radiators, set each one to the temperature you need for each space. If you don't have these valves – just turn off the radiators in any rooms you don't often use or areas which will warm up anyway from air coming from the rest of your home.


Have you ever thought about bleeding your radiator? It's something that I think we all can forget to do but it can help! When you bleed your radiator, you will allow air to escape which will help your radiator work more efficiently. Check for cold spots near the top of the radiator when the heating is on. Turn the heating off, and turn the bleed valve slowly with a radiator key. As you release the air (have a rag handy), make sure to be prepared for water to spurt out when the air has been expelled. You might need to top up the pressure in the central heating system using the filling loop on the boiler (check the manual to do it correctly).

Get smart with your heating. Think about when you actually need it on and the temperature it is at. You could set your heating timer to turn off an hour before you leave in the morning – your home will still stay warm, and you'll save an hour a day of heating. You could also think about doing this at night. You might even not want to bother with the heating in the morning. Ours wakes us up, and we are not around for long before we have left for work! Another easy tip is to make sure you keep those doors shut. Some people in your house might need reminding, but it's such a simple way to save energy!

If you live off the mains gas grid and are thinking of changing your boiler (maybe it has reached the end of its life), you might be eligible for the **Sustainable Warmth Shropshire** scheme. Check out the council's website for more information. If your home is well insulated, most people will be able to apply for a government grant for an air source heat pump. The grants went up in October 2023, so it may well be worth a visit: https://www.gov.uk/apply-boiler-upgrade-scheme/what-you-can-get
