Walking in their footsteps

I've always been drawn to pictures of footsteps. I don't know why. Perhaps it is because life is a journey and we all tread different paths. Sometimes those paths bring happiness and contentment; sometimes quite the opposite. A well-known adage says, '*Before you judge a man, walk a mile in his shoes.*' In effect, it is a reminder to practice empathy. The saying almost certainly is derived from a poem by Mary T. Lathrap, published in 1895. The original title of the poem was *Judge Softly*. Reminding us to **walk a mile in someone else's shoes** before judging them. We may never know or understand their experiences, challenges, pressures etc. It's easy to judge; the person sitting outside the supermarket begging—is he homeless and destitute or is he feeding an addiction? Or worse, is it more profitable than working or is she being forced into it? It's easy to feel threatened by people and situations we're not familiar with.

I can remember many years ago, when we lived in Reading, another lady and myself ran a Youth Club for children from a local estate. We started it because the children, as young as 5 years old, weren't allowed into the house after school and often had no tea to eat. They literally had nowhere to go, other than play havoc on the streets. We got to know them over the months and years. Some people felt threatened by them, but it brought tears to my eyes when, one Sunday, a couple of them came and sought me out in the church building and told me that there had been some dodgy goings-on round the back of the building. They weren't happy with that. Even though they didn't come to Sunday School, they felt they 'belonged' in their own way (which they did!) and had the courage to come and seek me out in what to them was very unfamiliar territory.

The boys weren't angels by any means and were often difficult to handle. Many times I went home and cried after a session. But I believe that God was at work in the mess. He taught me as much as he taught them. Our biggest problem was that, even thought the club was intended for 7-11 year olds, they'd bring their younger siblings, because they had no choice. They were young carers. At the other end of the spectrum, we thought that they'd automatically stop coming when they reached 11 and went to secondary school. But they wouldn't leave.

Over the years I've learnt that the more difficult a situation I find myself in, the more I need to look to see where God is. I usually find that he's closer than I think, gently guiding me through the mess. Take a read of the poem on the opposite page and see if anything resonates with you. 'There but for the grace of God walks any one of us.'

Revd Kina has settled into the Rectory and has been busy getting to


know us all. Do look out for her as she walks her dog around the village. She'd love you to stop and introduce yourselves.

My dear Nephew Darren,

Since I happened to be in your area last week, I tried to call in at your church, and was sorry to find it was locked and bolted, with surveillance cameras watching me.



We tend to be a little more relaxed about matters of security. The key to the medieval lock was lost some time during Queen Victoria's reign and never replaced. How someone managed to misplace a foot long piece of cast iron, weighing about 10 pounds is a mystery. If it had fallen out of someone's pocket, it would certainly have broken their foot. Ever since, no one has bothered with locking the door – which makes me wish our burglars last year had thought of trying it, before wasting so much energy smashing a stained-glass window when they visited in the early hours one morning. On the other hand, were the key still in use, I should probably be arrested these days for carrying an offensive weapon.

As with most rural churches, keys which open just about everything in the village are hidden in various parts of the church. The vestry key is under my seat cushion, the organ key under a vase on the altar, the church hall key on top of the hymn book cupboard, and Miss Simpson's spare front door key inside the font. I have never been certain whether the latter is there for safety, or as a general invitation. I am sure someone could usefully produce a book suggesting the many places that keys are likely to be found secreted in churches for the use of vergers, flower arrangers, cleaners – and thieves wanting to save themselves time and effort.

I suspect that the burdened look that many urban clergy wear is not because they are weighed down with parish troubles, but because they are obliged to carry with them a superfluity of keys needed to negotiate every door in church, hall, school, and vicarage. And why is there always one for which no one has any idea what it opens?

The only occasion I have ever thought it would be useful to be able to lock a church is when you have a party of visitors inside. So often, on hearing the words "let us pray" or the start of an appeal for funds, they bolt for the door.

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


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Letter from Westminster

This is the first opportunity I have had to confirm to readers of this magazine my decision not to seek the Conservative nomination at the next General Election. I have been moved by kind words expressed in the messages I have received, whether they came from those who supported me through the ballot box or otherwise.



This has been a difficult decision. I'm still loving the role as your Member of Parliament, so it's not because I've lost interest or am

exhausted, nor do I fear losing the election. In fact, I believe the Conservatives under Rishi Sunak's leadership, will be highly competitive at the next election.

Throughout my working life, whether by coincidence or not, it has divided into ten-year chunks. I have proudly served as the Parliamentary Spokesman for the Ludlow constituency for over 20 years, at the time of the next election, I will have served nearly 20 years as your Member of Parliament. I spent close to 10 years on the frontbenches and another 10 years on the backbenches, half of which I have served on the Environmental Audit Committee and will do so for five years as Chairman.

When I was first elected as your MP, I was 46 years old. Next month, I will turn 65. I still hope to have another decade ahead to remain active. However, the role of an MP demands a significant level of energy and commitment, both in assisting thousands of constituents each year and in advocating for important issues within Parliament and beyond.

I will continue to serve to the full and to the best of my abilities until the dissolution of this Parliament, as determined by the Prime Minister.

Being the MP for the Ludlow constituency has been the greatest honour of my life. I am eternally grateful to all those who placed their trust in me, allowing me the privilege to represent them. Thank you for entrusting me with this great role.


5) *Intensity.* This calls for more than starting power, it requires staying power.




Where does your treasure lie?



This month our regular contributor, Alastair MacNaughton, is unable to send us his page of tips to combat Global Warming and create a more sustainable culture. So here are a few thoughts from someone who comes from a generation when 'green' was just a colour, 'carbon footprint' was something that happened when you trod on a sheet of carbon from the typewriter (a machine we had for writing official letters, similar to a keyboard) and 'global warming' was a world event around campfires!

The world is definitely a different place to the one into which I was born, back in the 1950s. Although I can be a bit of a dinosaur myself sometimes, I do recognise that we wouldn't have a lot of the luxuries and things we take for granted if our world and its ideas didn't move forward. But I am very glad that it has now become popular to return to some of the old ways.

Forgive me for being biblical, but there is a verse in the Bible which seems to be particularly apt at the moment.

'Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls. ' (Jeremiah 6::16)

From time to time it does us well to stand back and assess how we are living our lives. The old ways are not all bad. Age does sometimes bring wisdom. I was taught to endeavour to live a life that was sustainable in the basics and then everything else is a bonus. So I applaud the return to paper bags and natural fibres, but in balance to the production or manufacture of these items. We live in a complicated eco-system and now also a virtual economy, in which everything is dependent on something else. There's no point in using paper if this destroys forests and upsets that balance, but what is the cost to our environment of technology in terms of its existence and production?

So, whilst the debate rages, perhaps it would do us all good to step back, as it were, and consider what is actually *essential* and what is, in effect, a luxury—be it in terms of our finances or material possessions or lifestyle.

I was appalled (yes, I really was!) to see a news item a few days ago when interest rates were increased. A reporter interviewed several people who bemoaned the fact that because of this rise, particularly to mortgages, they would have to cut down on take-aways, perhaps even give up their overseas holidays this year and even plan their meals and make a shopping list, only buying the essential ingredients for meals! Sadly there was no interview with those who are truly living in poverty and don't know where the next meal is coming from.

As someone who, at times, has made her own clothes from cast-offs, become an expert in what my husband calls 'left-over meals', budgeted to the last penny and has in part thrived on the challenge, I must admit, I think a lot of the 'ancient paths' are better!

Next month we hopefully return to Alastair's helpful hints on living in a sustainable, yet ethically better way. Val Smith
