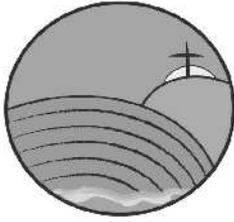

Every Knee shall Bow

When I was a child, I grew up with a sense that there were topics which you didn't bring up in conversation outside of your own household. As a teenager, this was clarified - you didn't discuss sex, politics or religion in polite company. How times have changed! Now, it seems, everyone has a view on these things and most are not afraid to express their viewpoint, sometimes forcibly. After all, freedom of speech is our human right, isn't it?

When I was teaching, I led a course on 'Rights and Responsibilities'. We looked at the Human Rights Act and had many a lively discussion on the corresponding personal responsibility we each have, for every 'right' that we claim. Such discussions can be healthy, as we formulate and exchange our thoughts on real topics rather than hypothetical situations – just as long as our arguments don't become too aggressive and personal!

I was also taught at an early age to stand up and be counted. In other words, not to sit quietly, hoping to become invisible, when things were happening around me that were just plain wrong.



Change for the better in these situations rarely evolves naturally. It usually takes brave people to speak out, often at a personal cost. Well known figures from history, such as William Wilberforce and Martin Luther King, for example, spent decades fighting for the rights of those who were being oppressed.

Over the last few weeks, the media has been full of reports of riots and unrest, marches and demonstrations, in response to the death of George Floyd, during an arrest in Minneapolis in May. These protests, in response to police violence against black people, quickly spread internationally. Marches, many of which began as peaceful protests, appear to have been infiltrated by those keen to provoke violence. Having lived in South Africa in the 1970s and early 1980s, I know only too well that violence doesn't bring peace. Even when the fighting is back under some sort of control, there is always a simmering unrest, anger bubbling beneath the surface, waiting to explode again.

The trouble is, you can pass all the laws you like, but unless there is real change in people's hearts, nothing actually alters. Until we are determined for things to be different, because we feel that the current situation is wrong, old attitudes continue.

... It reminds me of the parable of The Good Samaritan. The Samaritan in question went to the aid of someone who may well have shunned him in different circumstances, because of his ethnicity. The road along which he was travelling to Jericho was known to be dangerous. It was no more than a path through huge rocky outcrops. It was common for robbers to hide and leap out on lone travellers. By stopping to see if he could help, the Samaritan was risking his own life. But he did stop and he helped the man. He bandaged him up and got him to a place of rest and safety. He spent his own money to make sure that the man would be cared for, until he was well again.

The term 'Take the knee' has become synonymous with the 'Black Lives Matter' cause, as a peaceful way of showing solidarity with those who are affected by racial prejudice and inequality, or who are peacefully fighting the battle to change hearts and minds. It also reminds me of the words of an old hymn, the words of which are taken from Isaiah Chapter 45 in the Bible. It starts,

'At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow '

A man called Colin Smith wrote about that hymn. He says that at the end of time

'Women and men, young and old, black and white, rich and poor, Republican and Democrat, Muslim, Atheist, and Jew, movers and shakers from Hollywood, computer geeks and athletes – every knee will bow to God! Every tongue will confess to him! None of us will be smugly, with arms crossed, looking at our neighbour who rejected our faith, saying "I told you so" because we will be on our faces before Almighty God.'

FROM ST PETER'S CHURCH:




CHELMARSH FETE:

The churchyard at St. Mary's is managed as a wildlife area and crucial maintenance is carried out three times a year by volunteers of the Caring for God's Acre charity. Ever since the church was established, this has involved periodically cutting the grass and uprooting tree saplings and brambles that would otherwise take over. This is the classic way in which hay meadows are managed; as we now have so few meadows, churchyards such as Billingsley are precious resources.

Due to the lockdown, our Spring visit from Caring for God's Acre had to be cancelled and it is unlikely that they will be able to come along any time soon. Fortunately over the last week a team have come forward to cut back the grass and saplings and the transformation has been dramatic, as the photo opposite shows. 

Last year we had income totalling £68,400. 64% of this total was given by just 43 families who gave regularly by standing order, through the Parish Giving Scheme or envelopes.

The rest of our income, the other 36% came from a variety of other sources:-

- Plate collections at services
- One-off donations
- Fees for funeral and weddings
- Hall lettings
- Magazine sales and advertising

Last year we spent £3,000 more than our income. This year without income from hall lettings and no collections at services for the time being, we are anticipating that we may overspend by as much as £6,000

Letter from Westminster

Last month, the shocking impact of COVID19 on our economy was laid bare, with statistics showing the UK's GDP fell 20.4% in April – the largest monthly fall on record. This unsurprisingly coincided with a significant rise in people in South Shropshire claiming benefits to get by.

Every job lost is a tragedy, which is why it has been so critical for the government to put in place one of the most comprehensive packages of economic support anywhere in the world. In South Shropshire, figures up to the end of May show 9,500 jobs have been secured through the furlough scheme, and a further 4,400 people claimed for the Self Employment Income Support Scheme. This equates to over £12m of support for jobs here in South Shropshire alone.

On top of this, across the county, over £71m has been paid out to local businesses through the grant funding schemes, with further discretionary funding being allocated to some of those businesses that have fallen through the cracks.

So there has been significant intervention from the government so far, which has been crucial to sustaining jobs here in Shropshire. But the Chancellor will soon be outlining what further measures he will take to help the economy to bounce back from the effects of this wretched pandemic.



In anticipation, last month I joined colleagues from the Conservative Environment Network parliamentary caucus to write to the Prime Minister in support of a green economic recovery from COVID19, ahead of a further announcement expected from the Chancellor of the Exchequer this month. Our letter urged the Government to back the British green industries of the future and low-carbon infrastructure projects, such as electric vehicle manufacturing, renewable energy projects, and home energy efficiency retrofits, to bring jobs to all corners of the country while also putting the UK on track to meeting its world-leading net zero emissions target.

This in part reflects the work being undertaken by the Environmental Audit Committee, which I continue to Chair virtually while shielding. The Committee has recently taken evidence on the ability for the UK to raise its ambition for offshore wind even further - we already have the largest offshore wind sector in the world, and our geography and technical know-how puts us in a prime position to bring prosperity and jobs to areas across the country. We have also been pressing the government to make good its manifesto commitment to improve the energy efficiency of existing homes, which will be critical in meeting net zero by 2050, and could deliver many jobs at the same time.

The UK has had the fastest per capita falls in greenhouse gas emissions and the fastest per capita economic growth rate in the G7 since 1990, so we know that we do not have to choose between a strong economy and a healthy environment. The evidence from the last economic crisis shows green investments returned the most economic benefits. As we rebuild from this crisis, we should build back better, in a way that boosts our economy whilst delivering our commitment to leave our environment in a better state for future generations.

What's Distracting You?

'Don't get side-tracked'

Proverbs 4:27 (NLT)

Many of us fail, not because we aren't talented, determined, or passionate, but because we get 'sidetracked'. God told the prophet Habakkuk, 'Write the vision and make it plain on tablets, that he may run who reads it' (Habakkuk 2:2 NKJV). Unless you have a clearly defined goal and keep it before you at all times, you won't run in the direction you should. As motivational speaker and author Sam Horn said: 'It's hard to stay on purpose, if we don't know what our purpose is.' In his book *One Big Thing*, Phil Cooke writes: 'I've never been a fan of the person who invented the "open door policy". Sure, we want to be accessible to employees and co-workers, but at some point it's time to shut the door and get to work. After your next interruption by a visitor, make a note of how long it takes to get

back to your previous level of intensity and focus. You'll be shocked at how much time that steals from your day...Too often other people's needs come before our dream. Obviously we need to care for our children, honour our spouses, and deal with our primary responsibilities around our families or jobs. But the first step in achieving our dream is to take responsibility for it. That means scheduling it, and "unscheduling" the lesser needs of co-workers and friends. These daily commitments chip away at our time, and before long our dream gets lost in the shuffle. Stop doing what other people think is urgent, and start focusing on what matters to you' [and to God!].



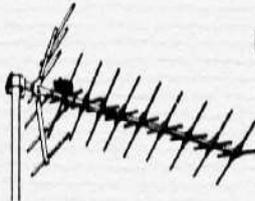



The Frailty of Life

According to one survey, during the lockdown, a quarter of adults in the UK have watched or listened to a religious service and one in 20 have started praying. While the majority of people who contract Covid-19 survive, it reminds us that we are more frail and weak than we like to think.

As the prophet Isaiah says:

'All people are like grass, and all their faithfulness is like the flowers of the field. The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the Lord blows on them. Surely the people are grass. The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures for ever.' (Isaiah 40:6-8)

Isaiah's words really resonate at this time. In more normal times we can avoid facing up to our vulnerability, but this pandemic has forced us to recognise our weakness and fragility.

However, this shouldn't lead us to despair or fear; rather it is an opportunity to worship and praise God for His constancy and care. In Peter's first letter he quotes this passage from Isaiah and says, *'For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God.'* (1 Peter 1:23) Peter contrasts our mortality with the eternal Word of God, which brings us new birth and life through the power of the Spirit. Jesus died for our sins and rose again to make us right with God, so that through faith in Him we can know eternal life. We don't need to be afraid of our frailty, for God is a dependable foundation on which to build our lives and face eternity.



St. Mary's Highley restoration Update

Restoration: Work is progressing on the tower, though not helped by the rain in June! By the time you read this I hope that the roof will have been re-tiled and the new mast and refurbished weather vane installed. Work is also progressing with various other stonework repairs and assorted lesser items that form part of the contract.

Currently areas that require some new stone facing are on hold as the quarries are yet to resume after lock-down, but hopefully will start to take orders soon.

Work on the porch has progressed and the water-damaged west wall repaired.

By the time you read this I hope that the front wall above the door will be repointed inside and out and the gaps between the porch walls reinforced and repaired.

Some exploratory work will be carried out soon at the base of the SW buttress to find out why it has moved slightly and decide what needs to be done.

We are currently unclear about timescales for completion, as this so much depends on weather, issues found when doing the work etc.



Church Re-Opening: You may have read that the Government has allowed churches to re-open for private prayer (specifically not any form of worship) from Saturday 13th June. This change came with extended guidance requiring that measures to minimise risks be put in place before opening occurs.

Unfortunately we cannot allow any access to the church until the work

on the porch is complete to ensure the safety of both workers and public. However, in parallel with this we are working on the provision of markers, sanitising gel, notices etc. We hope to allow private prayer at some time in July but probably limited to no more than 3 household groups (of up to 6 people) at any time, and opening hours may be limited to allow for cleaning.

We will place notices on the notice boards outside the church, parish hall and Severn Centre to let you know when the change occurs.

Pause to reflect

During the last few weeks Churches have been praying earnestly. Here is one insight:

I've been walking the footpaths where I live, and am struck time and again by how many glorious, majestic oak trees there are! I'm reminded of Isaiah 61:3 'They will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the Lord for the display of his splendour.'

Isaiah is proclaiming the year of the Lord's favour and the day of vengeance, to comfort all who mourn and grieve in Zion. In England, oaks were planted because they were needed to be masts for ships! In ancient Biblical times, however, oaks were sacred places used by worshippers of Pagan gods, where sexual immorality and even child sacrifice took place!

It sounds like Isaiah is claiming the oaks to be oaks of righteousness; cleansing them to be upright and good once more. Just as we need to be. English Oak has a great reputation for being solid. Like them, we need to stand strong; firm against the trials sweeping our country.

Pete Greig urged all praying people recently to heed what the Lord said to Solomon in 2 Chronicles 7:12 ...' if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land.'

When I looked closely at all of the oaks, I also loved how damage is visible in each tree, such as dead branches, chopped or contorted branches, but they can continue to grow and flourish regardless! We are all damaged and sinful people, but though God's grace and love we can also flourish!


